This is long overdue but I thought some of the club members might like an update as to what the Fast Electric crowd was up to in 2004.

Our normal weekly races at EMYC take place on Thursday evenings around 6:00 PM. Our season starts when the ice melts and ends when the ice returns. We usually run three heats each of two "spec" classes each Thursday. Those spec classes are:

Limited Spec Offshore – any plastic mono hull with an overall length of 26" or greater and a "700" size motor

Limited Spec Hydro – any plastic sport hydroplane hull measuring 24" or greater with a stock "700" size motor

The F/E group follows the North American Model Boat Association (NAMBA) rules. Well...we follow most of the rules that we like any way.

Most weeks a few of us will also run some our other "open" class boats on Thursday evenings as well.

The "spec" part of our racing has really caught on around the country. In fact our Limited Spec Hydro

class is now an official NAMBA class and is probably the most widely entered in the country. Former EMYC member Doug Campbell has manufactured one of the premier hulls for this class.



A number of us also compete in a few races every year in different parts of the country. In late June of 2004, Mark Anderson, Doug Campbell and myself traveled to Mazomanie, WI and gave the cheese-heads and others a run for thier money. I'll try not to sound like a braggart here but between Mark and myself I think we took home 13 trophies in the 11 classes that collectively were entered in. I won the

Mark and I again did very well in the trophy count. I was awarded the overall high points trophy for the race although because of the unconventional method in which the

The last race of 2004 was our own F/E spectacular that was held in September 2004. Andy Valentine runs this race for us and does a fantastic job. We had a good number of "out of towners" represented this year. Overall speeds weren't as spectacular as they could have been since the wind was causing rough water. Fortunately though the MN racers faired well and took a large number of the trophies. I was awarded high points overall as well.

A few weeks ago I traveled to Phoenix, Az to compete in a race with the Mesa Model Yacht Club. EMYC club member C. J. VanVoorhis is also a member of the Mesa club during the winter months. I had a very good showing and it was great to be out of the Minnesota weather for few days.

Coming up the first week of June 2005 will probably be the largest Fast Electric race that has ever taken place in the world. It's happening just out side of Detroit, MI and will serve as the NAMBA Nationals race for this year. Already there are more than 50



Don Sektnan showed his "Bouncy II" from antique Mechanix Illustrated plans. This "in bones" boat is being built "on the cheap" according to Don. Hollow door skins, cast off thin aircraft plywood, Axman motor, etc. all are incorporated.

CLUB MEMBER'S SUB TV DEBUT ANNOUNCED

The Discovery Channel has announced that the documentary about civil war era submarine designer Brutus DeVilleroi, called the "Hunt for the USS Alligator: The Navy's First Submarine", will air October 5 at 7 PM on the Science Channel and several more times throughout the month. This is the historical video that features an RC sub built by EMYC member Tim Smalley with the invaluable assistance of Paul Olsen and Kirk Brust.


The Union Navy's first submarine was built in early in the Civil War. Even before the world knew of the CSS Hunley, DeVilleroi constructed a 47-foot long submarine to counter the threat of the Confederate Navy's new ironclad, the CSS Virginia. Called the USS Alligator, this new submarine had hand-cranked, screw-propulsion, an air purification system and a diver lockout chamber--all revolutionary ideas in 1863. While being towed south by the USS Sumpter to participate in a mission to capture Charleston, South Carolina, violent storms forced the crew to cut its tow from the USS Sumpter and the Alligator was lost.

Late last September, Smalley traveled to the U. S. Navy's Carderock Manuever-

ing and Seakeeping model test basin in Washington, DC to participate in the Science Channel video shoot by operating his RC model of DeVilleroi's 37 foot salvage submarine (Alligator Junior) that the inventor used to prove to the Navy that a "submarine-propeller" can be a viable weapon of war.

"Dave Merriman's model of the USS Alligator, the follow-on boat to the one I modeled is the real star of the show," Smalley said. "I only ran mine on the surface on a foggy morning in the 'wild' at a local canal in the DC area for the cameras. Merriman's model was shot both at the canal and also in the Navy's 200 x 300 indoor test basin as well as in an explosion test pond outdoors. The model functioned flawlessly and the early footage I have seen of both model subs is spectacular.

Over the weekend of October 30-31, Smalley traveled to "The Alligator Symposium" sponsored by NOAA - the lead agency on the search to recover the USS Alligator, which was lost while under tow off Cape Hatteras. Tim made slide presentations to assembled officers and dignitaries from the US Navy, the Hunley Commission, NOAA, and many historic naval ship museums both days about DeVilleroi's first US submarine and how the model was constructed.




"The biggest thrill for me is that the model is going on display at the Independence Seaport Museum in Philadelphia. I owe that all to Paul and Kurt for helping me build a model that is worthy of display in an internationally known ship museum," Smalley added.


